
To make nice loops on head or eye pins:

- 1. String selected beads on the head or eye pin.
- 2. Keep about 8mm (1/3") of wire. Cut off any extra.
- 3. Use round nose pliers to grasp the wire just above the bead, at the arrow, and bend sharply away from you.
- 4. Now use small round nose pliers to grasp the tip of the wire, and bend it smoothly around the pliers down close to the beads.




Jump Ring Hint:

When you open and close jump rings, twist sideways instead of "ovalling" them. This keeps their shape better, which makes them easier to close all the way.

Double-Loop Knot




Lark's-Head Knot

Using Crimp Beads:

After stringing through your last bead:

- 1. Pass cord through crimp bead/tube,
- 2. through the clasp/ring,
- 3. back through the crimp,
- 4. (optional) back into your end bead to hide the cord.


You may then simply flatten the crimp tube or bead with standard round- or flat-nose pliers.



For a smaller, neater crimp, use crimping pliers (follow directions on crimping pliers packaging).

Using Bead Tips:

Tie a strong knot, bigger than the bead tip's hole. (Optional: tie a seed bead into your knot.) String bead tip as shown, and gently close over the knot. For best durability, attach loop to a jump ring, and then attach the jump ring to a clasp of your choice.



Using Coil Ends:

- 5. **Double** the end of your cord. (Optional: add a dab of glue.)
- 6. **Twist** the cord slightly as you push it all the way into the coil end. Since cord width varies, so does the ease of this step.
- 7. Using a regular pair of jewelry pliers, **crimp** down the last half coil, securing the coil end.



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
